Montabella's Use of Federal Relief Funds

Three years ago the state, nation and world faced an unprecedented challenge with the start of the COVID-19 virus. We are hoping that in our lifetimes we won't see anything similar to that again. The virus caused pain in many ways for all of us, too many to document in this article, but we gained some valuable knowledge and practices as a result of that challenge as well. One of the benefits for schools was that due to the inconsistent educational environment funds were made available to schools to help support the inconsistent learning that transpired. Montabella was a recipient of some of those funds and many of you might wonder where that money was spent.

T h e Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief funds (ESSER) for schools were intended for schools to deal with the potential learning loss that students experienced due to COVID-19. Montabella chose to invest a good portion of those resources into curriculum support and teacher training. Knowing that the money was a one-time distribution, if we could provide additional resources and training it could have an impact on student learning for multiple years well after the funds were gone. After receiving input from different stakeholders we began the process of determining which areas were of the biggest need and would have the highest potential impact on learning.

New curriculum resources have been purchased or are in the process of being purchased for Elementary Math, Secondary Math, Elementary Reading and Secondary Spanish. The resources are only the first step and the true impact on learning comes from the teacher so investments were made in training and development for our teachers. This came in the form of specific training on the new curriculum resources, instructional coaches that work directly with teachers, and instructional consultants that were brought into the district.

After just a few months of a few new practices and resources in place we are already seeing some initial indications that student learning is being impacted. We can't erase the learning time that was lost due to the pandemic but we can invest in our biggest asset, our staff, and help bridge as much of that gap as possible. We are confident that we have the right staff that can make gains in the right direction for our students.

SCIENCE OLYMPIAD

On Saturday, March 18th, twelve students traveled to Kinawa Middle School to compete in the regional Science Olympiad competition. They competed in seven different events, medaling in three of them.

- Ashlynn Davis, Keion Adams, Jadon Trost, Lillien Fuller, and Jade Burk competed in flight by building a rubber band powered airplane. Their plane did not crash and burn which earned them 6th place and a medal.
- Peyton Webb and Ella Kotenko competed in Forensics where they had to solve who committed a murder by utilizing chromatography, hair analysis, and other scientific techniques. The girls were close to solving the murder earning them 6th place and a medal.
- Kenzie Karcher and Natalie Ludwig took their knowledge of the human body and competed in Anatomy and Physiology. While completing a rigorous test they were able to out smart their opponents taking home 5th place and a medal.
- Kenzie and Natalie also competed in Forestry.
- Jlyn Chapman and Ashlynn Davis tried their hand in Rocks and Minerals. Their goal was to identify the different rocks and minerals by using their senses. They placed 7th coming up short of earning a medal.
- Peyton and Ella also competed in Write-it-Do-it where Peyton wrote down directions on how to build an object. Ella was provided the materials and Peyton's directions to create the bizarre object.
- Addyson Strohl and Jade Burk were testing the waters by building a bridge. This bridge was designed and built before the competition. The goal was to make the bridge weigh as little as possible while holding as much weight as possible. Their bridge weighed in at 54 grams and held over 9,000 grams! This earned them 8th place.
- Ashlyn Binge and Ella Kotenko competed in Codebusters. They worked hard to decipher different codes using math, algorithms, and common sense. Unfortunately they came up short of earning a medal but they had a positive attitude and are looking to improve for next year!

Overall the team took 9th place improving from previous years. They have worked hard and it is beginning to show! Montabella's Science Olympiad team has a bright future ahead of them!

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
